A lifelong resident of Hawaii, Alapa will be the first in her family to graduate from a four-year college. She is a 5th year senior, majoring in marine engineering technology, and a member of the Engineering Honors Society.

Michel is seeking a second bachelor's degree in marine transportation. A native of New Orleans, and in his third year, he plans to sail on tugs or supply boats.

Sabeh, from the San Francisco Bay area, is in his fourth year. He is a member of the Marine Transportation program and plans to become a licensed deck officer.

Since 1984, Crowley has provided more than half-a-million dollars in scholarship funding for more than 200 students at maritime academies and other select institutions. Katherine Brookshier Wins Hearst Scholarship

Katherine Brookshier of Benicia, CA, has been named as California Maritime Academy recipient of one of the California State University system's prized William Randolph Hearst/California State University (CSU) Trustees' Awards for Outstanding Achievement for 2009/10. Each year, the 23 campuses in the CSU system are invited to submit the name of a single award nominee for consideration by the Board of Trustees. Awards of \$3,000 each are then distributed, based on superior academic performance and exemplary personal accomplishments.

Brookshier, 31, is a Mechanical Engineering major in her senior yea. Her life story is a constant effort to overcome obstacles. The third of six children, her teen years were concentrated more on helping her family survive economic adversity than on her education. "I worked a full-time job while attending school and I barely graduated from high school."

Brookshier took a year-and-a-half after graduation to save up money for cosmetology school, while continuing to work full time. "I lost my job near the end, and wound up living in a tent, but I graduated tops in my class."

Her career path led to working for health and beauty spas and eventually to oversaw the installation of a spa facility on a Hawaiian cruise liner. "People kept asking me what my engineering background was. I told them I was a graduate of a beauty school and they couldn't believe it. They told me to think about a career in engineering, I chose Cal Maritime because of the outstanding recommendations it received from alumni I worked with. I was weak in high school math and science, but I'm proud of the fact that I was able to get admitted and worked hard to learn what I didn't know. I owe so much to this school for what they have taught me and the opportunities I have had."

Grants and loans have helped Brookshier pay for her education and she has also worked as an assistant in the Administration Building and on the Golden Bear to earn extra funds. "Being chosen as a Hearst Award winner means so much to me," she says, "not only because of the help it provides in my final year, but for the prestige of having been chosen as one of the winners."

New Vistas

Unlocking the Secrets of Polynesian Navigation

The Cal Maritime Simulation Center played host to a fascinating lecture on the re-discovered secrets of Polynesian navigation Wed. Sept. 23rd. Dr. Marianne "Mimi" George has been studying the nearly lost traditions and skills still practiced by 500 residents of the tiny Solomon Islands atoll of Taumako, north and east of Australia. Far removed from most trade lanes, its residents live on subsistence farming and fishing.

Dr. George has spent years visiting and sailing with these natives and learning how they build and navigate their handmade s. Although these skills had been disappearing in the late 20th, islanders began reviving them and passing them along to the younger generation.

In her lecture, Dr. George explained that early Polynesian navigators learned through long experience to "read" a combination of night stars, winds, waves and currents throughout the cycle of each year. That knowledge was passed forward as oral traditions from one generation to the next, enabling navigators to traverse literally hundreds of miles of open ocean and still arrive safely at other tiny island destinations to trade and communicate with other Polynesians.

Dr. George has been able to travel with these modern sailors and document their ancient skills. For her lecture, she brought one of the woven sails created by the Taumako islanders. Her photo exhibit, documenting vessel construction and sailing techniques, is now on display in the Simulation Center Lobby along with placards providing more information.

Historic Photos on Display in Wardroom and on TSGB

A new display of restored and beautifully framed black and white photographs, drawn from the Cal Maritime Library's Campus History Collections, is now hanging in the Wardroom at the back of the campus Dining Hall. They chronicle the early days of Cal Maritime from its founding in 1929 through the initial years here at Morrow Cove in Vallejo in the 1940s.

The images were selected by Archive Assistant Larry Stevens and Michele Gibney, a graduate student from San Jose State University who has helped develop an updated database of our archive photographs. Gibney also did much of the research to create the descriptive text placards which accompany each photograph. Stevens worked with a photographic studio to correct quality issues with some images dating back to the early part of the last century. He also made final decisions on framing and matting, and finalized text for the placards.


Another significant photographic display of campus history has been installed in the library aboard the Training Ship *Golden Bear*. The display features Cal Maritime training ship captains since the first cruise

back in 1931, plus all four of the Academy's training ships and their basic specifications. Library Director Carl Phillips said "Larry finished just minutes before the ship left on first cruise this summer. We worked collaboratively with the Captain's Office on a complete refurbishment of the Library and have received strong and positive feedback from those who took part in this summer's two cruises."


The Cal Maritime Library now has a database of over 3,000 digitized photographs in its current Campus History Collections. Phillips said that in the next few months, this resource will be made available to the campus community. "Photos are tricky to collect, preserve, and make accessible. The biggest issue is getting them labeled properly so that they can be retrieved."

With the annual homecoming set for October 9-11, Stevens will be reaching out to returning alumni to seek their help in verifying the accuracy of archival photos. "It is always fascinating to lay out archive photo albums and have alumni help us figure out who is in a given photo and what was happening at the time," he said.

High School Seminar at Cal Maritime

For the past five summers, CMA alumni Capt. Frank Whipple ('73) and Capt. Jim Morgan ('76) have led students from the Global Safety and Security Academy at Wilmington, CA's Banning High School through a week of training and life experiences here at Cal Maritime. This year, nine students from Seattle's Ballard Maritime Academy joined 31 Banning students for the week-long program. Joe Mendoza and George Kolarov from Banning and John Foster from Ballard were instructors.

Students completed STCW requirements by learning water survival skills, firefighting on Treasure Island, rowing in the Academy's lifeboats, and basic shipboard skills in the Simulation Center. Banning students get annual support from Metro Ports of Wilmington — formerly Metropolitan Stevedore. Ballard received a grant from the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration.

The program's mission is to broaden student horizons about job opportunities and career choices, and the value of teamwork. The program also helps them realize that a college education was something they can aspire to and achieve. While not designed as a recruitment program for Cal Maritime, the workshop clearly has an impact. Two women students from last year's Banning class entered Cal Maritime this fall and at the end of this year's program, two Ballard seniors announced they plan to apply for admission next fall.

Banning graduate Itzel Carranza,, is currently a junior Global Studies major and Division 1 Section Leader at Cal Maritime. She took part in the initial program in 2005 and says it changed her life. "I experienced self growth and maturity that gave me a larger vision for myself. I've set goals and gained confidence and know I can do anything that I set my mind to."

The summer program was developed by Whipple and Morgan and supported by




Watching the Inspectors

Admiralty and International Law Adjunct instructor Capt. Keith Graham, recently watched the Coast Guard conduct one of its first inspections of towing vessels on the West Coast. Until recently, coastal and inland towing vessels did not face the kinds of rigorous inspections conducted on larger ocean-going ships and tugs. Today, a new program requires full inspection and certification.

Graham went aboard the *Anne Carlander* in Tacoma (See September 2008 CURRENTS Supplement — in the News

section at www.csum.edu-- for Graham's account of sailing on the *Carlander* during a trip to Canada). The latest visit gave him a chance to observe and gain new perspectives as a maritime educator.

"The owner and crew of the *Carlander* spent weeks getting ready for the inspection," Graham reports. "It was not some perfunctory check of paperwork. It involved testing of all equipment, safety and security systems, environmental protection processes, and a review of certificates, licenses, records and plans.."

Workboat Upgrades Continue With New Electronics

Richard Muller reports that hard work this summer by Electrician Mick Bowlin and student workers Paul Rarang, Ray Tinio, Megan Herrick and Drew Kerlee saw the installation of a new Furuno RADAR/Plotter, AIS, and electronic compass on the Academy work vessels *Black Bear* and *Cub*. Working first on *Black Bear*, Leo Baclig and Oleg Kilafly removed the old radar mast and positioned its replacement out of the way of the vessel operator during maneuvering exercises run from the top of the wheelhouse. The mast also had to support the new radar AIS and GPS antennas. Doyle Duree helped with the design and ran new DC wiring to a panel in the

wheelhouse controlling power for all the new electronics plus the VHF radio, loud hailer, alarm system, compass light and other instrumentation. Both vessels have also received new cleaner and more efficient Caterpillar engines through a Carl Moyer clean-air grant from the State of California.
